So on with Newsletter 2 for May 2024.



MARTIN PARR IS A RENOWNED BRITISH DOCUMENTARY PHOTOGRAPHER, PHOTOJOURNALIST AND PHOTOBOOK COLLECTOR WHOSE MAJOR PROJECTS HAVE FOCUSED ON RURAL COMMUNITIES. HE IS KNOWN FOR TAKING AN INTIMATE, SATIRICAL AND ANTHROPOLOGICAL LOOK AT ASPECTS OF MODERN LIFE, IN PARTICULAR DOCUMENTING THE SOCIAL CLASSES OF ENGLAND, AND MORE BROADLY THE WEALTH OF THE WESTERN WORLD.

His work has been widely published and has featured in exhibitions throughout the world. This exhibition will include images commissioned by the Burton at Bideford to capture the spirit of Bideford Pannier Market.

Martin Parr is one of the best-known documentary photographers of his generation. With over 100 books of his own published, and another 30 edited by Parr, his photographic legacy is already established. Parr also acts as a curator and editor. He has curated two photography festivals, Arles in 2004 and Brighton Biennial in 2010. More recently Parr curated the Barbican exhibition, Strange and Familiar. Parr has been a member of the Magnum agency since 1994 and was President from 2013 - 2017. In 2013 Parr was appointed the visiting professor of photography at the University of Ulster. Parr's work has been collected by many of the leading museums, from the Tate, the Pompidou and the Museum of Modern Art in New York.



LAST CHANCE

Dingles historic fairground museum will be closing for good at the end of the 2024 season, it is situated near Lifton so makes a really good day trip which can be combined with a visit to Roadford reservoir. It is open from Easter (March 29th). Tickets booked online save 10% <u>Tickets - Dingles Fairground Museum (dinglesfhc.co.uk)</u> this is also where you can check which days it is open.

It is many years since I last visited and the fairground equipment was just arriving and being installed. There was at the time lots of steam heritage equipment, which has over time been very much usurped by the fairground rides. At the time of writing, it is £12 to walk around and view and additional tokens need to be purchased if you want to go on the rides which include: - Super Dodgems, Victory Gallopers, Moonrocket, Ghost Train, Chariot Racer Ark, plus kids rides and many fairground stalls. It is incredibly colourful and dynamic and I am certainly going to visit soon before the main tourist season starts. For Satnav users their postcode is PL16 0AT.

The National Trust has launched its new book *100 Photographs*. The book was showcased with a public talk from national curator of photographs Anna Sparham at The Photography and Video Show on 17 March, followed by a launch event in partnership with the book's sponsor CEWE. Spanning the history of photography from the 1840s to the present day, the book showcases 100 photographs chosen from the more than 250,000 held in collections at Trust properties. Alongside works by photographers such as Julia Margaret Cameron, Edward Chambré Hardman, Dorothy Wilding, Angus McBean and Jane Bown are remarkable images captured by less familiar practitioners. Professional studio portraits, landscapes and images of war sit beside family groups, domestic scenes and travel photographs by talented amateurs who provide glimpses into the way we have viewed and recorded the world over the last two centuries. Many of these photographs have only recently been discovered and are reproduced here for the first time. More than 25 per cent of the photographers highlighted are women.

LOOKING BACK

A leap forward of twenty years from the last newsletter to 1985 - oh come on you must remember that. More hair on the head than growing in the ears, the days of the yuppie with more pounds in the wallet than on the waistline. However, I think you will recognize more of the general events than the photographic highlights. Certainly, the year was marked by seismic social and political unrest, tragedy and landmark charitable initiatives.

On the world stage Margaret Thatcher was our Prime Minister, in the USA Ronald Reagan was sworn in for his second term of office as President, while in the Soviet Union Mikail Gorbachev became the General Secretary of the Soviet Communist Party and therefore leader of their nation.

In the UK social unrest continued unabated as the year began. The long running miners strike would soon come to an end during March but the animosity and ill feeling certainly did not. As he year progressed the country suffered first the Handsworth Riots later to be followed by the Brixton Riots. Reports suggested much of the social unrest stemmed from poverty and unemployment. Economists predicted unemployment would remain at over 3 million for the remaining years of the decade. This was coupled with inflation during the year averaging 6.1%. The brightspot for national productivity was seen as British oil production reached its peak at 127,000,000 tonnes for the year.

Elsewhere there was tragedy at sporting venues - the Bradford City stadium fire saw 56 football fans lose their lives. There was further disaster at the Heysel Stadium where 39 fans lost their lives and with over 600 others being injured. This was perhaps the peak of English football hooliganism on whom the Heysel disaster was blamed and resulted in the Football Association banning all english football clubs from competing in european competitions for some years.

In transport two ends of the size spectrum as we saw the commissioning of the aircraft carrier HMS Ark Royal, and the appearance of the somewhat smaller battery powered Sinclair C5 car or perhaps more properly tricycle which was launched by inventor Clive Sinclair. While the cars we were driving were also about to undergo massive changes - Peugeot started manufacturing the 309 small family hatchback in the UK becoming the first foreign car producer to do so. While builder Alfred McAlpine completed the construction of Nissan's new car factory at Sunderland. It was also during his year that Spanish car maker SEAT started importing cars into the UK. Disappearing from the roads Talbot models and their badge met their demise. Austin Rover offered us the new MG Maestro 2.0L with a top speed of 115mph from £5093 for the basic model up to a top of the range model at £7280.



Technology raced ahead - Vodaphone launched the first mobile phone network in the UK as British telecom announced the phased decommissioning of the iconic red telephone kiosks. New technology employed by pioneering maritime explorer Dr Robert Ballard saw the first vision of the Titanic since 1912 in both photographs and movie film. While in medicine the first UK heart-lung transplant was performed at Harefield Hospital.



Remember these, ending up rewinding tapes with a pencil and that special tape "Hiss" that certainly didn't help with the sound quality of anything whether classical music, jazz, pop or heavy metal.

On the high street British Home Stores and Habitat announced their amalgamation.

On a lighter note we were watching the Live Aid concerts for charity from London and Philadelphia on our TVs while donating on our credit cards. Without comment about anyones taste, other programmes getting lots of viewers were - the very first episode of Eastenders, A Woman of Substance based on the Barbara Taylor Bradford book was essential viewing for many, other popular programmes included - Dempsey and Makepeace, Dallas, Miami Vice, Apocalypse Now, Bulman, Transformers, Howards Way, Cats Eyes, Saint and Greavsie and the first Blind Date with Cilla Black.

Departing this mortal coil - Sir Michael Redgrave, Laura Ashley, Wilfred Bramble, Ray Ellington, Arthur Negus, Dr Richard Beeching, Roy Plomley, Philip Larkin, Robert Graves and PC Keith Blakelock murdered during the Broadwater Farm riot.

Meanwhile entering the world crying puking and pooping were - Lewis Hamilton, Keira Knightley, Lily Allen, Mark Cavendish, Joe Wicks and Wayne Rooney.

What were we craving photographically in 1985 -


JOBO offered us equipment to process colour as easily as black and white and to produce prints in 6minutes, process films in 15 minutes and slides in 30 minutes.

"Colour processing without getting hot and bothered",

It you did not want to get stained with chemicals you could send your exposed films to Club 35 who offered "Professional results for the serious amateur" 6" x 4" or 7" x 5" prints - 24 exposures for £3.95 or 36 exposures for £5.25.



Olympus users had a new club to join for £11.50 per annum, for which you would get a regular magazine with the enticement that the first three members were David Bailey, Patrick Lichfield and Terence Donovan.



Cameras on offer for the budget concious a £100 would buy you a Practica BC1 with a standard f1.8 lens. This would accept films in the range 12 -3200 iso and offer shutter speeds from 40 seconds to 1/1000 second.




Other manufacturers had their own offerings Canon had the F1, Bronica offered SQ-A giving 6 x 6 cm negatives, Richoh XR-P. Yashica had the FX3 Super SLR with centre weighted TTL manual metering from £109.



In the March 1985 Practical Photography headlined the Minolta 7000 as the "Camera of the Decade" offering "auto everything" and with the availibility of 12 different lenses. This was claimed to be the first camera offering auto focus, only made possible by the leap forward in the development of silicon chip technology.

The auto focus mechanism on this camera would not allow the shutter to fire if the subject was out of focus.





Interestingly the photo magazines of the time seem to have lots of small ads, not always directly related to photography.


Mrs Lock was advertising "naughty, saucy but nice glamorous lingerie" and also "a caring confidential service designed to help the physical problems within marriage".
